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US Consumers Lack Sufficient Repair Options

83%

say repairability is "very important"...

...when purchasing a new vehicle, and 60% say the same for large appliance purchases 57%

say there are not enough repair provider options...

...for vehicles, appliances, and/or electronics 53%

have replaced a product sooner than they wanted to...

...due to being unable to find a repair professional (includes 24% large appliance, 18% vehicle)



Repair or Replace? More Americans Opt to Replace



Among US adults, 35% replaced a broken large appliance in the five years prior to the survey

Just 18% repaired a broken large appliance in that timeframe


Reasons for not repairing:

- 50% repair cost too expensive
- 27% planning to/ wanted to replace
- 22% getting repair too inconvenient



Majority Support Right to Repair Legislation



Basic Consumer Rights are Necessary

- If you buy something, you should be able to fix it yourself or choose who fixes it for you
- Repairs should not cost the same as replacement
- You should not be forced to pay to replace an item due to poor manufacturing quality
- Planned obsolescence must be phased out and companies held to a higher standard for their manufactured products and accountable if they are poor quality





Goals of Right to Repair Legislation in the States

- Make parts and tools available: Individuals and repair shops should have access to the parts and tools—including diagnostic tools—necessary to repair their products.
- Make repair information available: Knowing how to perform repairs is equally
 essential. Individuals and repair shops should have access to manuals, schematics,
 how-tos, and software to bring down limitations on repair.
- Allow unlocking and customization: An owner should be able to adapt and modify their products and install custom software.
- Design "repair-friendly" products: Manufacturers of products should design their devices and equipment so they can be easily repaired and modified.



Right to Repair Legislation in the States

Agricultural Right to Repair Bills

Allows owners and independent technicians of farming equipment to access diagnostic tools, software documents, and repair manuals.

Wheelchair Right to Repair Bills


Allows wheelchair owners and independent repair shops to access parts, tools and documentation to diagnose, maintain and repair their devices.

Digital Right to Repair

Instructs original equipment manufacturers (OEMs) of consumer electronics to provide parts, tools, manuals, and other information to consumers and independent repair shops for the repair of their own devices.






Right to Repair Legislation Landscape
